Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2, in the County of Mercer, State of New Jersey, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and in compliance with audit standards prescribed by the Local Finance Board and by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2, in the County of Mercer, State of New Jersey, as of December 31, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

Adoption of New Accounting Pronouncement

As discussed in Note 1 to the financial statements, during the year ended December 31, 2015, the District adopted Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions - an Amendment of GASB Statement No.27* and GASB Statement No. 71, *Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date*. Our opinion is not modified with respect to these matters.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison information, schedule of the District's proportionate share of the net pension liability – PFRS, schedule of District contributions – PFRS and notes to the required supplementary information, as listed on the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 basic financial statements. The introductory section and other supplementary information are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The other supplementary information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The introductory section has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 3, 2016, on our consideration of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

For the Year Ended December 31, 2015

Unaudited

The discussion and analysis of the Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's financial performance provides an overall review of the District's financial activities for the year ended December 31, 2015. The intent of the discussion and analysis is to look at the District's financial performance as a whole; readers should also review the basic financial statements and notes to enhance their understanding of the District's financial performance.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) is an element of Required Supplementary Information specified in the Governmental Accounting Standards Board's (GASB) Statement No. 34 – *Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments* issued in June 1999.

Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for 2015 are as follows:

In total, net position decreased (\$6,165,775) from 2014. Due to the implementation of GASB 68, the previously stated net position was decreased by \$5,442,678 through a prior period adjustment.

General revenues accounted for \$3,793,768 or 100% of all revenues.

Per generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) basis, the District had \$4,216,184 in expenses including \$145,663 of depreciation and \$549,177 in additional pension expense to be in compliance with GASB 68 for 2015. General revenues (primarily taxes) of \$3,793,768 were not adequate to provide for these programs, resulting in a change in net position of (\$422,416).

Per Non-GAAP budgetary basis, the District had \$3,583,707 in expenditures and capital outlay and \$3,793,768 of actual revenue resulting in an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$210,061. The District did not need to utilize any of the \$122,536 of designated surplus approved in the 2015 budget to cover the cost of operations. General revenues (primarily taxes) were adequate to provide for these programs.

Using this Report

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements and notes to those financial statements. These statements are organized so the reader can understand Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 as a financial whole, an entire operating entity. The statements then proceed to provide an increasingly detailed look at specific financial activities.

This annual report consists of the following three parts: management's discussion and analysis, the basic financial statements, and required supplementary information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the District:

District-Wide Financial Statements (Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities)

These statements provide both short-term and long-term information about the District's overall financial status.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements focus on individual parts of the District, reporting the District's operations in more detail than the district-wide statements.

- The governmental funds statements tell how basic services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending.
- Fiduciary funds statements provide information about the financial relationships in which the District acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of others.

The financial statements also include notes that explain some of the information in the statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of required supplementary information that further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the District's budget for the year.

Reporting the District as a Whole Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities

The Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities provide information about the activities of the whole District, presenting both an aggregate view of the District's finances and a longer-term view of those finances. Fund financial statements provide the next level of detail. For governmental funds, these statements tell how services were financed in the short-term as well as what remains for future spending.

While this document contains the large number of funds used by the District to provide programs and activities, the view of the District, as a whole looks at all financial transactions and asks the question, "How did we do financially during 2015?" The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities answer this question. These statements include all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting similar to the accounting used by most private-sector businesses. This basis of accounting, takes into account, all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the District's net position and changes in those positions. This change in net position is important because it tells the reader that, for the District as a whole, the financial position of the District has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some financial and some not. Non-financial factors include the District's property tax base, current laws in New Jersey restricting revenue growth, facility condition, required programs and other factors.

Reporting the District's Most Significant Funds Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial reports provide detailed information about the District's funds. The District uses many funds to account for a multitude of financial transaction. The District's governmental funds are the General Fund and Capital Projects Fund.

Governmental Funds

The District's activities are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows in and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end available for spending in the future years. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the District's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps the reader determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance programs. The relationship (or differences) between governmental activities (reported in the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities) and governmental funds is reconciled in the financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the District-wide and fund financial statements.

The District as a Whole

Recall that the Statement of Net Position provides the perspective of the District as a whole. Net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. The District's financial position is the product of several financial transactions including the net results of activities, the acquisition and payment of debt, the acquisition and disposal of capital assets, and the depreciation of capital assets.

A summary of the District's Statement of Net Position and Statement of Changes in Net Position is presented below.

Governmental Activities

The unique nature of property taxes in New Jersey creates the legal requirements to annually seek voter approval for the District operations. Property taxes made up 94.4% of revenues for governmental activities for Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 for 2015. The District’s total revenues were \$3,793,768 for the year ended December 31, 2015. The state grants accounted for another .4% of revenue and other miscellaneous revenue accounted for the remaining 5.2%.

The Statement of Activities shows the cost of program services and the charges for services and grants offsetting those services.

Administration includes expenses associated with administrative and financial supervision of the District.

Cost of Operations and Maintenance involve keeping equipment in an effective working condition.

The District’s Funds

All governmental funds (i.e., general fund and capital projects fund) are accounted for using the modified-accrual basis of accounting. Total revenues amounted to \$3,793,768 and expenditures were \$3,510,013. The total change in fund balance for the year in the governmental funds was \$283,755.

As demonstrated by the various statements and schedules included in the financial section of this report, the District continues to meet its responsibility for sound financial management. The following schedule presents a summary of the revenues of the General Fund for the year ended December 31, 2015, and the amount of increases and decreases in relation to prior year revenues.

Capital Assets

At the end of the year 2015, the District had \$1,542,949 invested in capital assets net of depreciation. Table 5 shows 2015 balances compared to 2014.

In 2015, the District received the 2015 Ford Explorer for the Chief, which was ordered in 2014, for a total cost of \$45,284, including the conversion for the truck. Depreciation expense of \$145,663 was charged to governmental activities as part of its cost of operations in 2015.

Also in 2015, the District sold the 2003 Seagrave Pumper for \$119,950. The undepreciated balance of \$300,681 was written off the books in 2015.

Economic Factors

For the 2015 year, the Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 was able to sustain its budget through the district tax levy and other sources of revenue. Approximately 94.4% of total revenue was from the local tax levy, while the remaining 5.6% was from other sources. The tax rate levy per \$100 of assessed property valuation for 2015 remained at the 2014 level of \$.40.

For the Future

Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 is presently in good financial condition. The District is proud of its community support.

In conclusion, Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 has committed itself to financial excellence for many years. In addition, the District's system for financial planning, budgeting, and internal financial controls are well regarded. The District plans to continue its sound fiscal management to meet the challenge of the future.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 (the “District”) have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the District’s accounting policies are described below.

Reporting Entity

Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 is a political subdivision of the Township of Hamilton, County of Mercer, New Jersey. The District was formed to provide fire prevention and suppression services to the residents of Hamilton Township. The District functions independently through a Board of Fire Commissioners. The board is comprised of five members elected to three-year terms. The annual Fire District election is held the third Saturday of February.

In accordance with the requirements of Statement No. 14, *The Financial Reporting Entity, of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board* (GASB), the financial statements must present the District (the primary government) and its component units. Component units are legally separate entities for which the District (the primary entity) is financially accountable. Financial accountability is defined as the ability to appoint a voting majority of the organization’s governing body and either (1) the District’s ability to impose its will over the organization or (2) the potential that the organization will provide a financial benefit to, or impose a financial burden on, the District. Pursuant to this criterion, no component units were identified for inclusion in the accompanying financial statements.

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the Fire District conform to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) applicable to governmental funds of state and local governments in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 5:31-7-1. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the Board’s accounting policies are described below.

The basic financial statements report using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting generally includes the reclassification or elimination of internal activity (between or within funds). Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The tax revenues are recognized in the year for which they are levied while grants are recognized when grantor eligibility requirements are met.

Governmental fund financial statements report using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. Available means collectible within the current period or soon thereafter, within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred.

Fund Accounting

The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purpose and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions. The minimum number of funds is maintained consistent with legal and managerial requirements.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all the financial resources and the legally authorized activities of the District except those required to be accounted for in other specialized funds.

Fiduciary funds are used to account for assets held by a governmental entity for other parties (either as trustee or as an agent) and that cannot be used to finance the governmental entity's own operating programs which includes private purpose trust funds and agency funds.

District Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The district-wide financial statements report information of all of the nonfiduciary activities of the District. For the most part, the effect of inter-fund activity has been removed from these district-wide statements. District activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support. Individual funds are not displayed but the statements distinguish governmental activities as generally supported through taxes and user fees.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include charges to customers who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods or services provided by a given function, segment or component unit. Program revenues also include grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function, segment, or component unit. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues. The District does not allocate general government (indirect) expenses to other functions.

Net position is restricted when constraints placed on it is either externally imposed or imposed by constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Internally imposed designations of resources are not presented as restricted net position. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, generally it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, and then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

District Wide and Fund Financial Statements (continued)

The district-wide financial statements include the statement of net position and the statement of activities. These statements report financial information of the District as a whole. All inter-fund activity has been eliminated in the statement of activities. Individual funds are not displayed but the statements distinguish governmental activities as generally supported through taxes and user fees.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detail of the governmental funds.

Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its measurement focus. All governmental funds are accounted for using a current financial resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases (i.e. revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (i.e., expenditures and other financing uses) in net position.

The modified accrual basis of accounting is used for measuring financial position and operating results of all governmental fund types. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when they become both measurable and available. "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. State equalization monies are recognized as revenue during the period in which they are appropriated. A one-year availability period is used for revenue recognition for all other governmental fund revenues. Expenditures are recognized in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on general long-term debt which are recorded when due.

In its accounting and financial reporting, the District follows the pronouncements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and the pronouncements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

Encumbrances

Under encumbrance accounting purchase orders, contracts and other commitments for the expenditure of resources are recorded to reserve a portion of the applicable appropriation. Open encumbrances in governmental funds are reported as reservations of fund balances at fiscal year end as they do not constitute expenditures of liabilities but rather commitments related to unperformed contracts for goods and services. The encumbered appropriation authority carries over into the next fiscal year. An entry will be made at the beginning of the next fiscal year to increase the appropriation reflected in the adopted budget by the outstanding encumbrance amounts as of the current fiscal year end.

Revenues and Expenditures

Revenues are recorded when they are determined to be both available and measurable. Generally, fees and other non-tax revenues are recognized when received. Grants from other governments are recognized when qualifying expenditures are incurred. Expenditures are recorded when the related liability is incurred, if measurable, except for unmatured interest on general long-term debt, which is recognized when due.

Prepaid Expenses

Prepaid expenses recorded on the district-wide financial statements represent payments to vendors for services that will benefit periods beyond December 31, 2015.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include fire trucks, vehicles and equipment, generally result from expenditures in the governmental funds. These assets are reported on the government-wide statement of net position.

Generally, the District capitalizes assets with a cost of \$1,000 or more and a useful life greater than one year. All capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. The District does not possess any infrastructure. Improvements are capitalized; the cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the asset's life are not.

Depreciation has been provided over estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Fire equipment	5 – 10 years

Employee Benefits

Vacation, sick pay and other employee benefits are recorded as expenditures when paid except for other post employment benefits noted in Note 12.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Income Taxes

As a public body, the District is exempt from both federal and state taxes existing under statute.

Budget and Budgetary Accounting

The District must adopt an annual budget in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:14-78.1 et. al.

The fire commissioners must introduce and approve the annual budget no later than sixty days prior to the annual election. Upon introduction, the commissioners fix the time and place for a public hearing on the budget and must advertise the time and place at least ten days prior to the hearing in a newspaper having substantial circulation in the District. The public hearing must not be held less than twenty-eight days after the date the budget was introduced. After the hearing has been held, the fire commissioners may, by majority vote, adopt the budget.

Amendments may be made to the District budget in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:14-78.3.

Subsequent to the adoption of the District budget, the amount of money to be raised by taxation in support of the District budget must appear on the ballot for the annual election for approval of the legal voters.

Fire districts have a prescribed budgetary basis to demonstrate legal compliance. However, budgets are adopted on principally the same basis of accounting utilized for the preparation of the District's financial statements. Each annual budget lapses at the end of the year..

Fire District Taxes

Upon proper certification to the assessor of the municipality in which the District is located, the assessor shall assess the amount of taxes to be raised in support of the District's budget in the same manner as all other municipal taxes. The collector or treasurer of the municipality then pays the assessed taxes in four equal installments to the treasurer or custodian of funds of the District.

Deferred Outflows and Deferred Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future periods and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

Pensions Section

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the pension plan's fiduciary net position and additions to/deductions from the plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the plan. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Fund Equity

In accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions, the District classifies governmental fund balances as follows:

- Non-spendable – includes fund balance amounts that cannot be spent either because it is not in spendable form or because legal or contractual constraints.
- Restricted – includes fund balance amounts that are constrained for specific purposes which are externally imposed by external parties, constitutional provision or enabling legislation.
- Committed – includes fund balance amounts that are constrained for specific purposes that are internally imposed by the government through formal action of the highest level of decision making by the District and does not lapse at year-end.
- Assigned – includes fund balance amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes that are neither considered restricted or committed. Fund Balance may be assigned by the Administrator.
- Unassigned – includes balance within the General Fund which has not been classified within the above mentioned categories and negative fund balances in other governmental funds

Reserves represent those portions of fund equity not available for appropriation for expenditure or legally segregated for a specific future use. Designated fund balances represent plans for future use of financial resources.

Net position

Net position, represents the difference between summation of assets and deferred outflows of resources, and the summation of liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. Net position is classified in the following three components:

- Net Investment in Capital Assets – This component represents capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, net of outstanding balances of borrowings used for acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- Restricted – Net position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the District or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments.
- Unrestricted – Net position is reported as unrestricted when it does not meet the criteria of the other two components of net position.

Adopted Accounting Pronouncements

For the year ended December 31, 2015, the District implemented GASB Statement No. 68 *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions – (Amendment to GASB Statement No. 27)* and GASB Statement No. 71, *Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date*. The implementation of the Statements requires the District to report as an asset and/or a liability its portion of the collective net pension's asset and liability of the New Jersey Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) and New Jersey Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS). The implementation of the Statements also requires the District to report a deferred outflow and/or inflow for the effect of the net change in the District's proportion of the collective net pension asset and/or liability and difference during the measurement period between the District's contributions and its proportionate share of total contributions to the pension systems not included in pension expense.

Also included as a deferred outflow is the District contributions to the pension system subsequent to the measurement date.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS AND CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash used for the day-to-day operations of the Fire District is in a non-interest bearing checking account and interest bearing savings and money market accounts. For presentation in the financial statements, investments with an original maturity of three months or less at the time they are purchased by the District are considered to be cash equivalents. Investments with a maturity of more than three months, if any, are reported as investments.

New Jersey fire districts are limited as to the types of investments and types of financial institutions they may invest in. New Jersey statutes provide a list of permissible investments that may be purchased by New Jersey fire districts.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The District has adopted a cash management plan that requires it to deposit public funds in public depositories protected from loss under the provisions of the Government Unit Deposit Protection Act ("GUDPA"). GUDPA was enacted in 1970 to protect Governmental Units from a loss of funds on deposit with a failed banking institution in New Jersey.

N.J.S.A. 17:9-41 et. Seq. establishes the requirements for security of deposits of governmental units. The statute requires that no governmental unit shall deposit public funds in a public depository unless such funds are secured in accordance with the Act. Public depositories include Savings and Loan institutions, banks (both state and national banks) and savings banks the deposits of which are federally insured. All public depositories must pledge collateral, having a market value at least equal to five percent of the average daily balance of collected public funds, to secure the deposits of Governmental Units. If a public depository fails, the collateral it has pledged, plus the collateral of all other public depositories, is available to pay the full amount of their deposits to the Governmental Units.

Bank deposits

All bank deposits are classified as to credit risk by the three categories. **Category 1** consists of bank deposits insured or collateralized with securities held by the District of in the District's name by its agent. **Category 2** consists of bank deposits collateralized with securities held by pledging public depository's trust department or agent in the District's name. **Category 3** includes uncollateralized deposits including any deposits that are collateralized with securities held by the pledging public depository or by its trust department or agent but not in the District's name. At December 31, 2015, the District's deposits of \$1,417,257 are classified as Category 1 deposits.

New Jersey Cash Management Fund

During the year, the District participated in the New Jersey Cash Management Fund. The fund is governed by regulations of the State Investment Council, which prescribes the standards designed to insure the quality of investments in order to minimize the risk to the Fund's participants. At December 31, 2015, \$99,535 maintained within the New Jersey Cash Management Fund is not subject to categorization as defined above.

NOTE 3 - INVESTMENT – CERTIFICATE OF DEPOSIT

On January 26, 2015, the District purchased a 12-month certificate of deposit from Grand Bank for \$46,315. The certificate of deposit bears interest at a rate of .8% and is compounded daily. Earned interest each month is credited to the deposit. Interest earned on the deposit as of December 31, 2015 was \$303.

Also in 2015, the District sold the 2003 Seagrave Pumper for \$119,950. The undepreciated balance of \$300,681 was written off the books in 2015.

NOTE 5 – ACCRUED EXPENSES

Accrued expenses include professional fees that were incurred for the year ended December 31, 2015 but were not paid by that date.

NOTE 6 – PENSION OBLIGATIONS

Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS)

Plan Description

The State of New Jersey, Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS) is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of New Jersey, Division of Pensions and Benefits (the Division). For additional information about PFRS, please refer to Division's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) which can be found at www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions/annrprts.shtml.

The vesting and benefit provisions are set by N.J.S.A. 43:16A. PERS provides retirement, death and disability benefits. All benefits vest after ten years of service, except disability benefits, which vest after four (4) years of service.

The following represents the membership tiers for PFRS:

<u>Tier</u>	<u>Definition</u>
1	Members who were enrolled prior to May 22, 2010
2	Members who were eligible to enroll on or after May 22, 2010 and prior to June 28, 2011
3	Members who were eligible to enroll on or after June 28, 2011

Service retirement benefits are available at age 55 and are generally determined to be 2% of final compensation for each year of creditable service, as defined, up to 30 years plus 1% for each year of service in excess of 30 years. Members may seek special retirement after achieving 25 years of creditable service, in which benefits would equal 65% (tiers 1 and 2 members) and 60% (tier 3 members) of final compensation plus 1% for each year of creditable service over 25 years but not to exceed 30 years. Members may elect deferred retirement benefits after achieving ten years of service, in which case benefits would begin at age 55 equal to 2% of final compensation for each year of service.

Allocation Methodology and Reconciliation to Financial Statements

GASB Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions*, requires participating employers in the New Jersey Police and Firemen’s Retirement System (PFRS) to recognize their proportionate share of the collective net pension liability, collective deferred outflows of resources, collective deferred inflows of resources and collective pension expense excluding that attributable to employer-paid member contributions. The employer and nonemployer allocation percentages presented and applied are based on the ratio of the contributions of an individual employer to the total contributions to PFRS during the measurement period July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015. The employer and nonemployer allocation percentages have been rounded for presentation purposes, therefore amounts may result in immaterial differences. Contributions from employers are recognized when due, based on statutory requirements.

Special Funding Situation

Under N.J.S.A. 43:16A-15, local participating employers are responsible for their own contributions based on actuarially determined amounts, except where legislation was passed which legally obligated the State if certain circumstances occurred. The legislation which legally obligates the state is as follows: Chapter 8, P.L. 2000, Chapter 318, P.L. 2001, Chapter 86, P.L. 2001, Chapter 511, P.L. 1991, Chapter 109, P.L. 1979, Chapter 247, P.L. 1993 and Chapter 201, P.L. 2001. The amounts contributed on behalf of the local participating employers, under this legislation, is considered to be a special funding situation as defined by GASB Statement No. 68 and the State is treated as a non-employer contributing entity. Since the local participating employers do not contribute under this legislation directly to the plan (except for employer specific financed amounts), there is no net pension liability or deferred outflows or inflows to report in the financial statements of the local participating employers related to this legislation. However, the notes to the financial statements of the local participating employers must disclose the portion of the non-employer contributing entities’ total proportionate share of the collective net pension liability that is associated with the local participating employer.

Contributions

The contribution policy for PFRS is set by N.J.S.A. 43:16A and requires contributions by active members and contributing employers. State legislation has modified the amount that is contributed by the State. The State's pension contribution is based on an actuarially determined amount which includes the employer portion of the normal cost and an amortization of the unfunded accrued liability. For fiscal year 2015 and 2014, the State's pension contribution was less than the actuarial determined amount.

The local employers' contribution amounts are based on an actuarially determined rate which includes the normal cost and unfunded accrued liability. Chapter 19, P.L. 2009 provided an option for local employers of PFRS to contribute 50% of the normal and accrued liability contribution amounts certified for payments due in State fiscal year 2009. Such employers will be credited

Contributions (continued)

with the full payment and any such amounts will not be included in their unfunded liability. The actuaries will determine the unfunded liability of those retirement systems, by employer, for the reduced normal and accrued liability contributions provided under this law. This unfunded liability will be paid by the employer in level annual payments over a period of 15 years beginning with the payments due in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012 and will be adjusted by the rate of return on the actuarial value of assets.

Components of Net Pension Liability

At December 31, 2015, the District reported a liability of \$7,719,344 for its proportionate share of the PFRS net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2015. Additionally, the State’s proportionate share of the net pension liability attributable to the District is \$676,961 as of December 31, 2015. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2015. The total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined using procedures to roll forward the total pension liability from an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2014, to the measurement date of June 30, 2015. The State’s proportion of the net pension liability associated with the District was based on a projection of the District’s long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating members, actuarially determined. Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 5.79% as of June 30, 2015. The single blended discount rate was based on long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.90%, and a municipal bond rate of 3.80% as of June 30, 2015, based on the Bond Buyer Go 20-Bond Municipal Bond Index which includes tax-exempt general obligation municipals bonds with an average rating of AA/Aa or higher. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employee contributions will be made at the current member contribution rates and that contributions from employers will be made on the average of the last five years of contributions. Based on those assumptions, the plan’s fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make projected future benefit payments of current plan members through 2045. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on plan investments was applied to projected benefit payments through 2045, and the municipal bond rate was applied to projected benefit payments after that date in determining the total pension liability.

Obligation under Capital Lease

2012 Fire Rescue-Pumper

On March 6, 2012, Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 adopted Resolution 2012-04 and awarded a bid to Kovatch Mobile Equipment Corp. (“KME”) to build a new Fire Rescue-Pumper. On May 9, 2012, the State of New Jersey, Division of Community Affairs, Local Finance Board approved the financing for the project. On July 13, 2012, Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 entered into a Master Municipal Lease Agreement, Lease Number 08613, with Suntrust Equipment Finance & Leasing Corp for the acquisition of a 2012 KME Fire Rescue-Pumper.

The lease provides for annual payments in the amount of \$66,057.39 for ten (10) years beginning on April 1, 2013 and ending on April 1, 2022. The annual rate of interest is 2.38%. The acquisition cost of the rescue pumper with the lease was \$585,597, not including equipment for the vehicle of \$6,390.

NOTE 9 – LOAN PAYABLE

On January 26, 2015, the District entered into a loan agreement with Grand Bank for \$44,000 to fund the purchase of the 2015 Ford Explorer. The loan requires sixty (60) monthly payments of \$785.50, including interest at 2.8%, through January 26, 2020. The first payment was due on February 26, 2015. NOTE 10 – GRANTS

Supplemental Fire Services Grant

Annually, the Supplemental Fire Services Program (SFSP) from the State of New Jersey, awards a grant to the Fire District for volunteer fire services. By acceptance of the grant, the Fire District agrees to all obligations and responsibilities pursuant to the SFSP as provided in Ch. 295, P.L., 1985.

The funds are utilized for the purchase of items as defined in compliance with state statutes. The grant was budgeted for \$14,199 for the year ended December 31, 2015. The District received and expended \$14,199 for the year ended December 31, 2015.

NOTE 11 – OTHER PENSION RETIREMENT PLANS

Deferred Compensation Plan

The Fire District has a deferred compensation plan under section 457(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, which was approved by the State of New Jersey, Department of Community Affairs. The purpose of this Plan is to provide an optional benefit to employees whereby a designated amount of the participant's compensation is withheld each month from his paycheck and is then invested in the plan according to the investments the employee selected. An employee becomes a participant when he has executed and entered into an agreement with the employer. A participant must agree to defer a minimum of twenty dollars per payroll period or such greater amount as specified by the employee in his agreement. For 2015, the maximum amount deferred could not exceed the lesser of \$18,000 or 100% of normal compensation. There was a catch-up contribution of \$6,000 allowed for those individuals who were age 50 and over. The agent providing administrative services for the plan is The Variable Annuity Life Insurance Company. Employee contributions for 2015 were \$34,075.

Defined Contribution Retirement Program

State of NJ 401(a) Plan

The Fire District also has a defined contribution retirement program ("DCRP") through the State of New Jersey Division of Pension and Benefits covered under section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended. The purpose of this DCRP is to provide elected or appointed officials, who are eligible, with a tax-sheltered, defined contribution retirement benefit, along with life insurance and disability coverage. The District is responsible for enrolling an eligible elected or appointed official. When enrolled, the eligible official contributes 5.5% of the base salary to a tax-deferred investment account established with Prudential Financial, which jointly administers the DCRP with the New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits. Member contributions are matched by a 3% employer contribution. Employer contributions for 2015 were \$753. Employee contributions for 2015 were \$1,842.

NOTE 12 – OTHER POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

HEALTHCARE

Plan Description

The District participates in the New Jersey State Health Benefits Program (“the SHBP”), which qualifies as a cost-sharing, multiple-employer plan in accordance with GASB Statement 45 “Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Post-employment Benefits Other Than Pensions” (“OPEB”). The SHBP is administered by the State of New Jersey, Department of Treasury, Division of Pensions and Benefits.

Under the SHBP, retirees may continue the health benefits programs in which they are enrolled at the time of retirement, provided the retiree pays the costs of the benefits (at group rates) for themselves and their eligible dependents.

The State of New Jersey, Department of the Treasury, Division of Pensions and Benefits, issues publicly available financial reports that include the financial statements and required supplementary information of the SHBP. The financial reports may be obtained by writing to the State of New Jersey, Department of the Treasury, Division of Pensions and Benefits, P.O. Box 295, Trenton, New Jersey 08625-0295.

The SHBP is established under the District of N.J.S.A. 52:14-17.25 et seq. and regulations adopted by the State Health Benefits Commission. The required contribution rate is determined on an annual pay as you go basis. The health insurance cost for retirees for the year ended December 31, 2015 was \$35,196.

SICK PAY

Each employee receives 120 hours of sick time per year. Unused sick time may be accumulated toward post-retirement payment. The calculation of accumulated time is based on an equation determined by the Commissioners of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2, County of Mercer, State of New Jersey. It is based upon number of years already worked and approximate number of years to retirement for each employee who has accumulated sick time. An hourly rate is determined and applied toward the unused sick time. The result is divided in half to determine the amount of the final payment. The final payment cannot exceed \$16,000. Based on accumulated sick days as of December 31, 2015, the sick pay due employees under the terms of the contract at death or retirement was \$78,830.

NOTE 13 – SHARED SERVICES AGREEMENT UNDER THE UNIFORM SHARED SERVICES AND CONSOLIDATION ACT

In 2015, Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 entered into shared services agreements for a Fire Chief with Hamilton Township Fire District No. 3, 4, and 7 in accordance with the provisions of the New Jersey Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1 and all regulations promulgated thereto.

In consideration for Hamilton Township Fire District No. 3 providing these services, Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2, 4 and 7 shall reimburse the District for a portion of the Fire Chief’s actual payroll, benefits and expenses. Shared service expense for District No. 2 for the year ended December 31, 2015 was \$28,382. District No. 2 terminated the agreement with District No. 3 in July 2015.

NOTE 14 – RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters.

Property and Liability Insurance

The District maintains commercial insurance coverage for property, liability and surety bonds.

NOTE 15 – DATE OF MANAGEMENT’S REVIEW

Subsequent events have been evaluated through November 3, 2016, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events were identified that required adjustment to or disclosure within the financial statements.

NOTE 16 – LITIGATION

As of the date of this report there is no litigation pending which, if decided adversely to the District would have a material impact on the District.

NOTE 18 – DEFICIT IN UNRESTRICTED NET POSITION

As reflected on the Statement of Net Position, a deficit in unrestricted net position of (\$4,707,172) existed as of December 31, 2015. The primary cause of this deficit was the recording of the long-term liability for net position. In accordance with full accrual accounting, which is the basis of accounting for the Statement of Net Position, such liabilities are required to be recorded in the period in which they are incurred. However, in accordance with the rules and regulations that govern the District in the formulation of their annual budget, pension liabilities that relate to future services, or that are contingent on a specific event outside the control of the District and its employees, are funded in the period in which such services are rendered or in which such events take place. Therefore, this deficit in unrestricted net position does not indicate that the District is facing financial difficulties.

Budgets and Budgetary Controls

Annual budgets are prepared each year for the operations of the fire district. The budgets are approved by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. The budgets are then voted upon by the public, at the annual fire district election held on the third Saturday in February. Budgetary transfers may be made during the last two months of the year.

Formal budgetary integration into the accounting system is employed as a management control device during the year. For governmental funds there are no substantial differences between the budgetary basis of accounting and generally accepted accounting principles. Encumbrance accounting is also employed as an extension of formal budgetary integration in the governmental fund types. Unencumbered appropriations lapse at fiscal year end.

Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS)

Basis of Presentation

The amounts presented in the Schedules were prepared in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles. The numbers were derived in a report provided by KPMG dated April 19, 2016. The full report is available by the State of New Jersey, Division of Pension and Benefits. Such preparation requires management of PFRS to make a number of estimates and assumptions relating to the reported amounts. Due to the inherent nature of these estimates, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Changes of Benefit Terms

The vesting and benefit provisions are set by N.J.S.A. 43:16A. PFRS provides retirement, death and disability benefits. All benefits vest after ten years of service, except disability payments which vest after four years of service.

Changes of Assumptions

Mortality rates were based on the RP-2000 Combined Healthy Mortality Tables projected one year using Projection Scale AA and one year using Projection Scale BB for male service retirements with adjustments for mortality improvements from the base year based on Projection Scale BB. Mortality rates were based on the RP-2000 Combined Healthy Mortality Tables projected fourteen years using Projection Scale BB for female service retirements and beneficiaries with adjustments for mortality improvements from the base year of 2014 based on Projection Scale BB.

The actuarial assumptions used in the July 1, 2014 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2013.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and audit requirements as prescribed by the Local Finance Board and by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey, the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 as of and for the year ended December 31, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated November 3, 2016.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial



statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of Hamilton Township Fire District No. 2 in a separate letter dated November 3, 2016.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance.
